

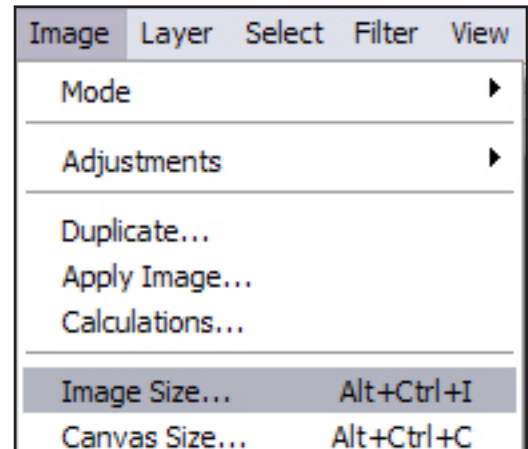
## Image Sizing

As you may already know there are two different meanings to the term “size of a file”. Of course one refers to the actual amount of space that the file will take up. The other refers to the dimensions of the actual image. If your image is 4 inches by 3 inches (as is the normal photo size). Then it is already too big for your webpage. An image on the screen should never really go beyond 320 pixels by 240 pixels, unless detail is very important. In this case you would want to make a smaller image that links to a larger image. When taking a photo with a digital camera or importing an image with a scanner, the photo will usually come out to large. We must resize.

## Resizing image

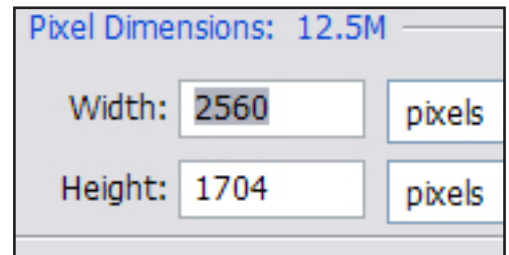
Once you have opened an image that you would like to resize we must go to a certain window that will allow us to edit these changes. To open that window we will..

- 1) In Adobe Photoshop’s Menu Click on Image > Image size
- 2) The “Image Size” will appear.

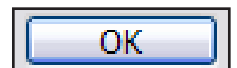


We will look at the area of the window labeled “Pixel Dimensions”.

- 1) In the input box labeled “Width” type in “320” . because the window is set to “Constrain Proportions” Adobe Photoshop will proportionately fix the “Length” of the image



- 1) Click on the OK button.



Chances are you may see your image smaller than it really is...to see your image at it’s actual size...

- 1) In Adobe Photoshop’s Menu Click on View > Actual Pixels
